The Basics

Who can attend Junior Camp/Quad?

Children must be at least 5 years old and have **completed five-year-old kindergarten**. The maximum age is 14.

We accept children, both from the community as well as employees' children, including those with special needs, providing that we can adequately meet the child's needs without endangering the health or well-being of the child, other children or the staff. Our staff-to-child ratio does not allow for one-to-one care.

When does camp run?

Camp starts Thursday, June 12, and runs through August 29, 2025. Care after August 29 will be offered at the Sussex Center. A note of this should be made on your schedule. Please arrange for other care prior to June 12.

We are licensed from 6 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Monday through Friday to accommodate our production schedules. However, many classrooms close by 6 p.m. See director for more details.

Where is the camp located?

Junior Camp/Quad is held in the Quad Care facility just across the street from Quad's Pewaukee plant on W224 N3297 Duplainville Road.

How much does camp cost?

The following schedule outlines camp costs.

Are meals included?

Lunch is included in the daily rate, and is \$3.75 for anyone on the hourly rate. Supper is \$3.75.

How much do field trips cost?

Trip costs are listed in the brochure. Trip fees are supplemented by fundraisers, billed to your account and will be found in your billing statement. Field trips are our most popular days and are scheduled on a first come first served basis. Once bus capacity is reached, additional kids can be put on a waiting list. With enough attendance, a second bus can be ordered.

How do I enroll my child?

What is the registration deadline?

We will continue to accept registrations as long as we have room in our program. However, registrations received after May 16 may not be processed in time to begin on your desired start date. Registrations that are filled out <u>in entirety</u> will receive a \$25 discount. (Check your instruction sheet for instructions on filling out forms). Space is limited so enroll soon!

How will I know if my child has been accepted into camp?

Confirmation of acceptance will be made via email, in person or by phone. In the event of an incomplete registration, you will be notified and asked to submit missing requirements before enrollment is confirmed.

Quad families with children that attend camp for 4 hours or less per day will pay an hourly rate of \$8.65 for the first child and \$7.55 for each additional child. Hourly rate does not include meals.

Community Families with children that attend camp for 4 hours or less per day will pay an hourly rate of \$12.05 for the first child and \$10.85 for each additional child. Hourly rate does not include meals.

Payment arrangements

- We require a non-refundable registration fee upon enrolling your child. Enrollment will not be confirmed until registration fee is received.
- Camp paperwork is audited by camp staff before being reviewed by the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families and must be fully completed. We request that paperwork be completed and turned in for processing a few weeks prior to the first day of camp. Incomplete paperwork requiring multiple audits will be assessed a fee of \$25.
- Each family that enrolls is required to submit a payment agreement.
- We only bill you for the days your child attends. However, you may be billed if your child is scheduled for an event that we are scheduled/billed for and your child does not attend.
- No minimum day commitment!
 However, pre-week and post-week
 enrollment (critical scheduling) is
 reserved for those families who are
 enrolled in the program and attend on
 a regular basis through the summer.
 Families scheduled who do not attend
 on a regular basis may not be allowed
 to attend during critical scheduling
 weeks (pre-week and post-weeks).
- We offer flexible scheduling to accommodate for summer school and other commitments. Please ask for details.
- Junior Camp/Quad tuition is eligible for dependent flexible spending reimbursement.
- Anyone not using the employee
 flexible spending plan must pay in
 advance either by credit card, check,
 a state funded program or through
 another flexible spending plan. A late
 fee will be assessed if prepayment
 is not received and care may be
 suspended until payment is made.
- Current pretax dollars can only be used for childcare tuition incurred during the current calendar year.
- Camp fees can be payroll deducted for Quad employees.

Our awesome staff!

- All Jr. Camp/Quad staff members meet or exceed those requirements set by the state of Wisconsin Department of Children and Families Early Care and Education Division.
- Staff members are required to participate in regular staff meetings and in-service trainings.
- Jr. Camp/Quad staff are mandated reporters for child abuse and neglect as required by the State of Wisconsin Department of Children and Families.
- Many staff members are returning counselors; some were even campers at one time!





A typical day

We pack our days full of fun, whether we're heading out on a field trip or spending the day at base camp. Here is what your camper can expect.

Field Trip Day

We offer field trips each week except pre- and post-weeks. All campers participate in field trip activities; exceptions must be cleared with camp director prior to trip. Spending money is acceptable on some trips but should be limited to a few cash dollars. Our counselors will help campers understand the value of their money. Because field trip days are our most popular days, campers are scheduled on a first-come first-served basis. Once we have reached bus capacity, campers will be put on a waiting list. Depending on total attendance, a second bus may be ordered, or a counselor may stay at base camp with the extra campers. However, we will not leave a counselor at base camp for one child.

Campers will work on fun ways to learn the basics of these skills while learning the skills of thinking "outside the box."

Campers will have the opportunity to end the week in a drawing to swap places with a counselor for the day!
